The font's clean, no-nonsense style works well on signs or notices and in headlines, and gives an authoritative look to any sort of information design.

We've opted for the use of Bahnschrift Light and **Bahnschrift Bold**, in order to keep things cohesive but be able to differentiate information.

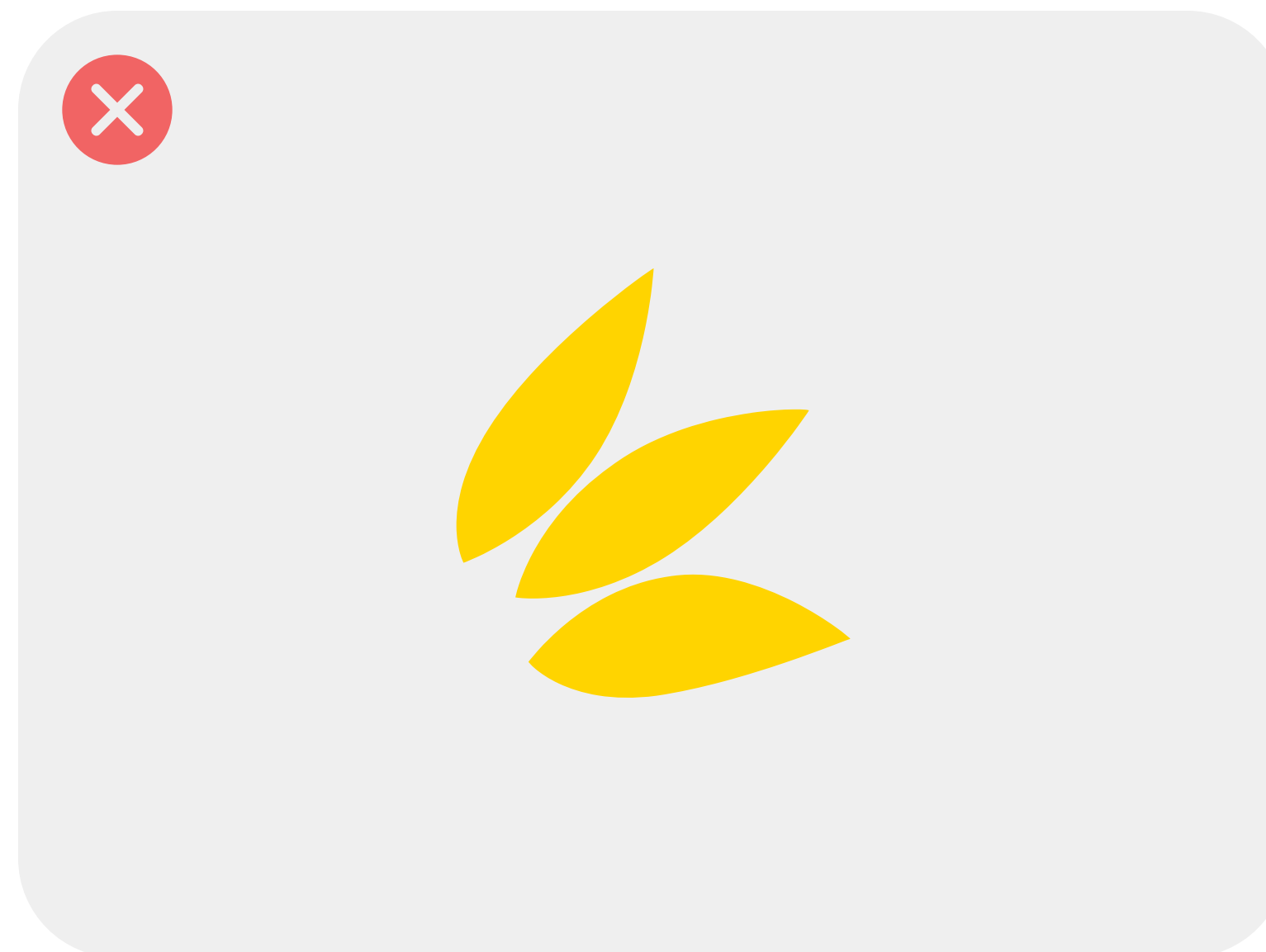

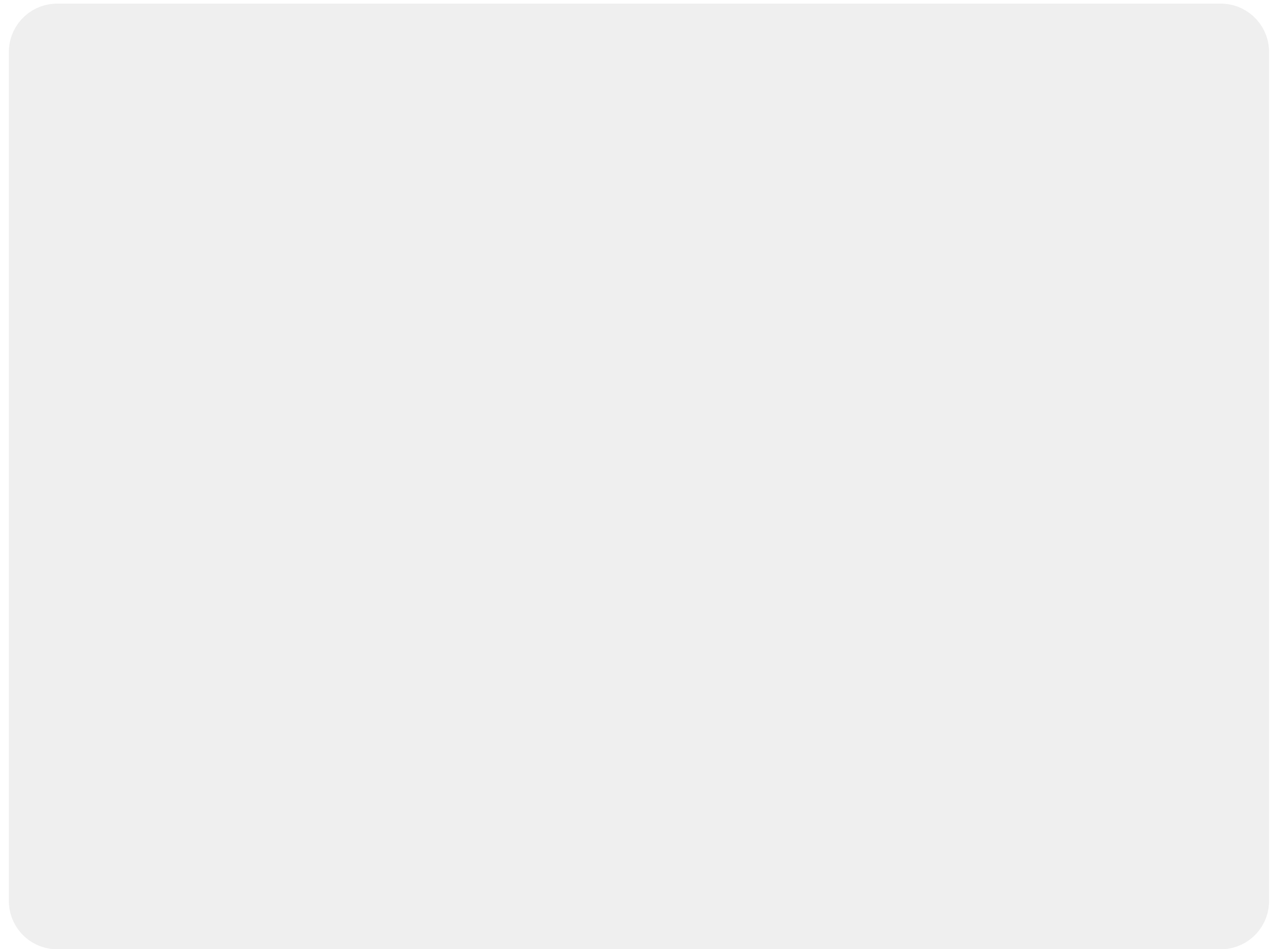

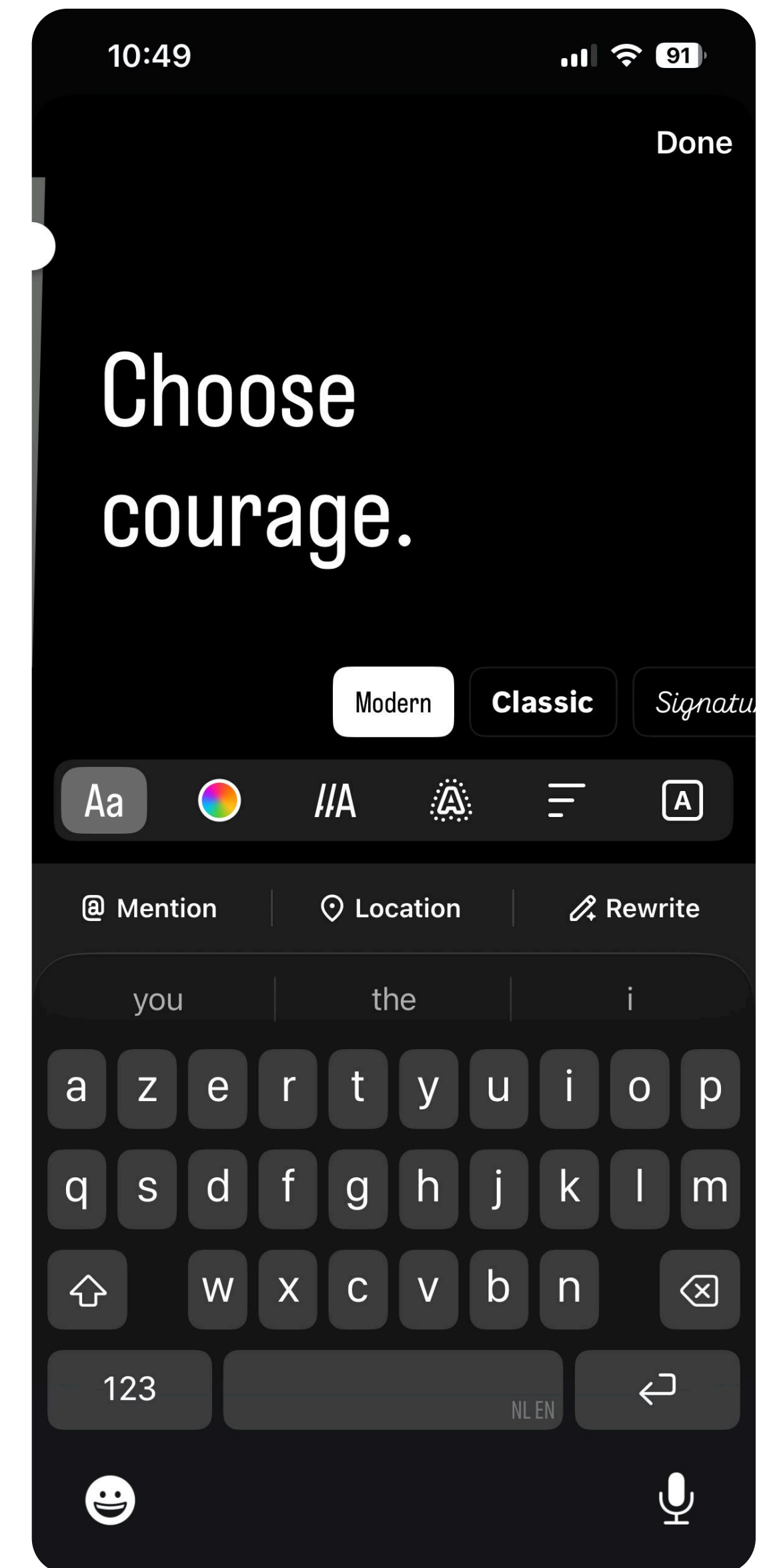

Press Statement Brussels, 1 December 2025

The Greens and Progressives in the CoR take a strong position against nuclear power

On Wednesday 1 December, the Greens and Progressives in the European Committee of the Regions (CoR) adopted a statement in the light of the upcoming decision of the European Commission on the classification of sustainable investments. Classifying nuclear power as sustainable, and the promotion of nuclear power under the European Green Deal, is at odds with a climate-friendly, low-risk and sustainable EU energy policy.

Nuclear power is not sustainable, as operations bear massive environmental and health risks, storing radioactive waste creates an infinite burden for future generations, and building and maintaining nuclear power plants require huge public investments. Operating nuclear power plants involve hazards that can make entire European regions and countries uninhabitable. Nuclear energy is at odds with the do no harm principle.

Nuclear power is no longer competitive with renewable energy, which is quicker and cheaper to develop. During the Greens and Progressives in the CoR Group Meeting on 1 December, members of the group expressed serious concern about ongoing greenwashing of nuclear power. The Greens and Progressives in the CoR co-president Bernd Voss said:

"The operation of nuclear power plants entails risks that can make entire regions and countries uninhabitable. It fundamentally contradicts the 'do no harm' principle and undermines the Taxonomy Regulation as a serious instrument."

Taxonomy The Greens and Progressives in the CoR against nuclear power to be classified as sustainable investment

In the light of the upcoming decision of the European Commission on the classification of sustainable investments, the Greens and Progressives in the Committee of the Regions express their strong opposition to the possible inclusion of nuclear power:

Classifying nuclear power as sustainable and the promotion of nuclear power under the European Green Deal is at odds with a climate-friendly, low-risk and sustainable EU energy policy.

If investments in nuclear power would be labelled as 'sustainable', it would attract more investors such as banks, insurance companies and other financial market actors, but also individuals and small investors. However, nuclear power is not sustainable for example, for the following reasons:

1. that active citizens and their equal right to democratic involvement is fundamental for both the European Union and its regions, cities and municipalities. New forms of civic participation should be used more widely through citizens' dialogues with randomly selected citizens
2. the voice of women, minorities and young people must be heard more strongly in decision-making.
3. that the EU has seen an increase in voices attempting to undermine fundamental and democratic values, partly due to recent common challenges such as the migration policy reform and the covid-19 pandemic.
4. in the need to move from unanimity to majority voting in the EU Council in areas where this is already possible under the Treaty.
5. in the need to strengthen the EU on issues where European action has added value, in particular on issues of European or global dimension. These include asylum policy, cutting-edge research or climate action.
6. that the role of LRAs should be enhanced to reinforce democracy, strengthen rule of law, improve transparency and uphold regional identities. LRAs are the level closest to the citizens, and can therefore act as an example as well as promote these among citizens and civil society. Moreover, LRAs play an important role in the promotion, protection and respect of fundamental rights, including putting them into practice.

Introduction

Active citizens and their democratic involvement is fundamental for both the European Union and its regions, cities and municipalities in view of shaping our common future.

Only a European Green Deal, in which all policy areas are consistently integrated – agriculture as well as industry, transport, housing, education and social inclusion – will become a sustainable growth strategy for Europe. The more time we lose on the way to 100% renewable energy, the higher the economic costs will be. The just transition has to happen now – this is the only way we can secure our well-being also for future generations, have decent jobs and retain mobility. Therefore, we need binding targets in the EU for the upcoming years in order to achieve the climate and energy objectives.

Regions, cities and municipalities need sustainable investment opportunities, as EU policies are largely implemented on regional and local levels. The EU has to provide for the appropriate financial support, and EU funding must significantly contribute to achieving the Paris climate targets while strengthening social justice. The European Committee of the Regions can play a key role in putting the Green Deal into practice.

The Greens and Progressives in the CoR want to see Europe ensuring equal opportunities to all its citizens. We want to offer our children quality education no matter where they grow up and guarantee them a future with hope and opportunities. We want to ensure the biodiversity in our forests and seas and we want climate change to be stopped.

We strive for inclusive communities where people can trust their voices to be heard and their civil rights to be respected. We strive for creating jobs that take into account not only people's needs but also the environment's vulnerability.

We see humanity as a universal human right, which is non-negotiable and forms the value basis for all our actions. Therefore, we urge for just and human treatment for those in vulnerable situations, such as refugees and asylum seekers. The European Union must find means to help partner countries in developing democracy, fighting climate change and fulfilling their obligations on human rights.

This document sets the political objectives within each CoR Commission towards which the Greens and Progressives in the CoR strive for. Some aspects touch upon several Commissions, but are only mentioned in the most relevant one.

7. that the rule of law is a cornerstone of the EU and that no disrespect of the rule of law can be accepted. If existing EU instruments prove to be ineffective in the long term, new and more effective instruments, also in the form of Treaty changes, need to be considered.
8. monitoring and countering disinformation and hate speech, while maintaining freedom of expression, to be crucial.
9. the Conference on the Future of Europe to be a further chance to shape a more democratic and socially just political future.
10. in the importance of external relations with our immediate neighbours and beyond, and in working with countries of the Global South on cross-sectoral and mutually beneficial development.
11. in feminist and anti-racist foreign policy, which identifies and corrects structural discrimination and injustice.
12. that all Western Balkan countries are an integral part of a common Europe and they must be supported in their accession process, particularly in strengthening the rule of law, tackling corruption and organised crime, and in their green transition.

Rapporteurships

- By October 2024, the Greens count 13 rapporteur roles since 2020, with final opinions adopted in 2021, 3 in 2022, 4 in 2023 and so far, 2 in 2024
- The highest numbers were drafted in NAT and ENVE (4 each), followed by COTER (2). One was prepared in ECON and SEDEC each.
- An additional opinion is currently under preparation in CIVEX, and is expected to be discussed at the Commission meeting in March 2025





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


